October is Fire Prevention Month



October is National Fire Prevention Month, a time when we should all be aware of ways to help learn fire safety and prevention. Most Americans underestimate their risk for fire, and many either lack emergency response plans – or fail to practice them with fire drills.

One out of three home fires start in the kitchen, and leaving cooking unattended and other unsafe kitchen practices are recipes for disaster. Annual observances like National Fire Prevention Week and National Fire Prevention Month are excellent opportunities to focus on fire hazards – but we should all practice fire safety every day—at home, at work and at play. The NFPA offers a wealth of safety information, fire prevention tips and resources on their comprehensive website: <u>www.nfpa.org</u>. And I encourage everyone to contact your local fire department to learn more about making your home safer from fire, or how you can best participate in fire prevention activities. But why is the national prevention month in October?

The history goes back to the great Chicago fire, which occurred on October 8, 1871. This fire killed more than 300 people, left 100,000 homeless and destroyed more than 17,000 structures. The cause of the fire has both unknown, however, fact and fiction have both become blurred over the years. One popular legend has it that Mrs. O'Leary was milking her cow when the animal kicked over a lamp, setting the O'Leary barn on fire and starting the spectacular blaze. However it began, the massive fire swiftly burned more than 2000 acres in 27 hours. When President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed the first National Fire Prevention Week, October 4 - 10, 1925, he noted that in the previous year some 15,000 lives were lost to fire in the United States. Calling the loss "startling", President Coolidge's proclamation stated, "This waste results from the conditions which justify a sense of shame and horror; for the greater part of it could and ought to be prevented... It is highly desirable that every effort be made to reform the conditions which have made possible so vast a destruction of the national wealth".

NFPA continues today to make National Fire Prevention Week a priority and counts on the participation and efforts of tens of thousands of fire and safety professionals, emergency volunteers, and other individuals working to reduce the risk of fire and the toll it takes on our society.

Find a Harry Potter for Math Class

Many parents would be too embarrassed to admit being illiterate and it is doubtful they would use such as an excuse for their child's failure to do well in school. On more than one occasion, however, I have had parents say to me, "I never could do math, so my child's difficulty in algebra just comes naturally." This statement is usually accompanied by a smile and a chuckle, as if to imply, genetics is funny that way. The very person, who would never admit to being illiterate, has no qualms about admitting to being innumerate.

In an effort to combat illiteracy, "Reading is Fundamental" and other literacy programs have been around for more than a generation. Researchers have found effective methods for teaching people of all ages the ability of going from a single letter to words and sentences. Even though we don't have a "math is fundamental" program, I suspect that it is going to take more than the efforts of classroom teachers to get the general population to recognize the importance of mathematics.

Mathematics needs to be viewed as a "second language" that uses symbols in place of words to convey meaningful expressions. It needs to be a language that transitions as effortlessly to the science classroom as does the written word from the English classroom to social studies. Like any second language, the earlier one is exposed to the components of the new language, the easier it is to learn and to become fluent.

As parents and grandparents many of us make bedtime reading a ritual. We give books as gifts for special occasions and discuss with our children the books they have read. We want children to find the written word enjoyable and to develop a desire for more reading experiences. It is true that often pre-school and elementary age children are given books that teach counting and basic number operations. Perhaps we need to continue giving books that stress numbers as our children get older. Reading with small children fosters a love for the written word, could setting aside time to solve number puzzles make learning mathematics more enjoyable? Puzzle books with Suduko, Kakuro, or Numbrix are available with varying degrees of difficulty, but have you ever given one as a gift?

Critical thinking skills are acquired by the process of arriving at an answer, the methods necessary to search and conquer the problem, not by the answer itself. Children stood in line for the latest installments of the Harry Potter series and I would venture a guess that nary a one ever uttered the question asked in algebra classes everywhere, "When are we ever going to use this?" If only we could instill that kind of love for the manipulation of numbers! Frustrated math teachers joking say to students, who insist they can't learn algebra or geometry, "we aren't teaching rocket science." When in fact the teachers know that without a firm foundation in algebra and geometry there would be no rocket science.

There have been numerous articles discussing both the shortage of engineers in our country and the need to encourage more high school students to take advanced classes in math and science. There have been recent articles about the benefits of IB and AP programs that prepare students for the careers of the future. But, shouldn't we be fostering a love of numbers long before high school. Innumeracy, like illiteracy, is not a laughing matter. Great strides have been made in fostering a culture that reads. Perhaps it is time to consider cultivating a deeper understanding of the mathematical process. It is going to take more than the efforts of classroom teachers to eliminate the need for TAKS tests, or for "No Child Left Behind" standards, in order to make a difference in the way children view mathematics.
